3. Describe your project and how it will address urban forestry needs in your community.

The City of Shelby is working to complete tree maintenance, one park at a time, hiring professional tree care specialists to complete structural pruning. In reviewing our parks and public spaces, city officials felt that our efforts should focus on maintenance of the current tree population before additional trees are planted. The City of Shelby recently conducted an updated tree inventory which has provided us with pivotal information as to the current state of our trees and how we can improve our tree population.

Our parks department accomplished a substantial amount of maintenance over last summer with 151 trees pruned, 4 removed and 4 planted. With this number being miniscule in the number of city trees in need of pruning, the city is in dire need of hiring experienced arborists to complete this large task before our tree population suffers greatly. The first step will be to structurally prune the trees by removing broken, injured, diseased or dying branches; remove any diseased and dead trees; and open the canopy to allow more light and improve the stability of trees within our parks and public spaces. The city successfully completed City Park, Splash Park and part of Andy Anderson Park in 2023, with hopes to complete Johnson Park, Williamson Park, Lincoln Park and the remainder of Andy Anderson Park as funding allows.

Along with working our way through each park we are working to implement a better yearly maintenance schedule to keep our tree population healthy moving forward. With our current tree inventory being done in June of 2024, we have a very clear, very recent grasp on where our tree population currently sits, and it is not good. For instance, in just one of our parks, Johnson Park, which consists of sixty-nine trees, our tree inventory reflects forty-eight trees in need of maintenance (70% of the park population), eight of which are in critical need due to public safety concerns. Our tree inventory has aided us in identifying those areas most desperately in need to allow us to create a prioritized approach. However, with the number of trees in critical need of care, without receiving grant funding to assist us, it will take us years to get the tree care back under control. Receiving funding would allow us to get our trees in better and more healthy shape faster at which point we can adjust to better regular maintenance routines moving forward.

4. How will you sustain this work beyond the grant period?

Beyond the grant period the city plans to implement better and regular tree care to keep our tree population healthy and thriving for many years to come. Currently the amount of work needed is overwhelming for our small city crew so by having a professional arborist come and get things cleaned up and in proper shape our city will be able to better manage things moving forward to maintain the work that we are hoping to have done this summer.

This project would involve the City of Shelby and the arborist company that is awarded the bid.




